


The Washington Park Arboretum--Update to the Seattle City Council Parks Committee

This is our annual report to the Seattle City Council on progress to date.



SR 520 Negotiations—Chronology for the Arboretum

- December 2010--Mitigation Plan Submitted to the Legislature which included a list of mitigation projects.
- March 2011--Memorandum of Understanding between WSDOT and the Arboretum parties signed; specific projects included.
- 2011 & 2012--WSDOT pays Seattle Parks & Recreation to prepare preliminary plans and budgets for mitigation projects.
- Fall 2011--Negotiations on a term sheet between WSDOT and the Arboretum began and all terms were negotiated by spring 2012, except the amount of WSDOT's financial contribution to the projects.
- Since then discussions have slowed; WSDOT has not yet offered any details on how much money they will contribute to the mitigation projects.
